# KEEPING IN MIND SOME DESIGN GUIDELINES

- utilize the sun actively and passively to reduce lighting, heating and cooling costs
- Combining spaces and open floor plans
- Separate the sleeping areas
- Visual screening of bathrooms
- Consider how individual rooms will be used
- Try to accommodate for future change
- Provide as much storage as possible
- Avoid excess circulation space (hallways)
